

CONFLUENCE OF SCIENTISTS: FIVE TIPS FOR YOUR NEXT

FROM YOUR NETWORKING COORDINATOR, ANDREW CALE, CLASS OF 2016

Much like the dural venous sinuses converging at the confluence of sinuses, researchers, educators, and health professionals also regularly converge at scientific conferences. These events are incredible opportunities to advance your career by networking with colleagues and learning the latest research in your field. However, with all the back-to-back events, bustling crowds, and diverse opportunities available at a conference, the whole process can feel a bit...overwhelming. Here are a few tips for making the most of your next scientific conference:

1. Pack your bags: Now before you stuff a week's worth of professional clothing into your luggage and run off, let's talk about a few additional things you might want to pack as well. If you're presenting at the conference, be sure to pack your poster or

PowerPoint files as well as any items that accompany your presentation such as 3D-printed models, videos, modules, etc. Unfortunately, luggage gets lost and accidents happen so back up your files and bring duplicates of physical items if it's possible.

Business cards and printouts of your poster can also be incredibly useful. These can be pinned up next to your poster or quickly handed out while you're networking. An extra phone charger or battery pack can also prove invaluable when your phone dies after a long day in an unfamiliar city.

Finally, bring a positive attitude - you're going on an adventure!

2. Make a game plan: So, you made it to the conference. Now what? With all the presentations, workshops, and events occurring simultaneously throughout each day, it's impossible for you to attend everything, unfortunately.

To make the most of your time, create a game plan before you arrive at the conference. Begin by considering what you would like to accomplish by attending this conference. Are you interested in learning something specific? Searching for a job or PhD program? Building your professional network? Looking for mentors or collaborators? If you don't have a specific goal in mind just yet, that's ok too! Conferences are great opportunities to explore all the diverse aspects of your field that you may not have known about!

Afterwards, look through the conference programming and schedule the events related to your goals or interests into your day (EB has an app for that!). If there are specific people attending the conference that you would like to meet with, you can schedule in some time to...

3. Network with other attendees: One of the best parts about attending a conference is the opportunity to connect with other individuals from your field. These conference attendees could be potential colleagues, collaborators, mentors, or maybe even friends. It may feel a bit daunting, but don't be afraid to approach them and strike up a conversation. Networking opportunities can present themselves at any time too, so prepare an elevator pitch and don't forget your business cards! (You remembered to bring those, right?)

Networking with conference attendees doesn't have to be limited to just the conference either. Feel free to reach out to people before the conference and don't forget to follow up with them afterwards too!

- **4. Get on Twitter:** Even if you're not an avid social media user, consider creating a Twitter account to use during the conference. Not only is Twitter a fantastic tool for connecting with other attendees, but it's also great for staying updated with all the conference happenings, even the ones that you may have missed. Follow the conference hashtag or Twitter correspondents and join the conversation!
- 5. Take care of yourself: Conferences can get pretty hectic. In the midst of all the madness, don't forget to practice a bit of self-care. Try your best to maintain both your physical and mental health by sleeping a reasonable amount, managing your diet, and taking breaks. Don't feel obligated to stay in the conference center the entire time! Think about it this way: you can't enjoy the conference if you're out of commission!

1. What is your favorite memory from MHA? I think one of my favorite memories from MHA includes all of the get together dinners at Dr. Spitzer's house. I thought it was such a wonderful tradition that really emphasized the tight knit community the MHA program is.

I focused on expanding the slides and quizzes database on Dr. Lee's virtual histology lab, as well as testing long term retention of students who used the interactive gaming feature.
