The results from the <u>Green Center's Series 10 Quick COVID-19 survey</u> are now available, n=700+ clinician respondents. After 2.5 months, primary care practices are beginning to report some modest improvements. However, the overall picture remains tenuous with 40% continuing to report laid off or furloughed staff. For those of you who wish to contribute to this week's survey (due May 26th), you can access the form <u>here.</u> The survey focuses questions on financial loss and sustainability. Responses will be shared with senior CMS and HHS staff and leaders.

They also voted against increases for faculty and staff.

Community Health Workers: Developing Standards to Support these Frontline Workers during the Pandemic and Beyond is a post on the Milbank Memorial Fund blog by Shrey A. Kangovi and Margaret O'Kane about the value of community workers, a workforce of ~50,000 people across the United States, typically employed by community organizations, health systems and public health departments.

"Where are the heart attacks" Denver doctors worry people are waiting too long for help because of coronavirus fears is a story in The Denver Post by Meg Wingerter about how Denver-area hospitals report ER visits down 30-50% in April amid the pandemic compared to the same month last year.

Colorado frontline health workers share personal struggles with COVID-19 is a Fox 31 story by Kevin Torres who reports on the personal stories of two frontline medical workers who participated in a COVID-19 series hosted by the Denver Museum of Nature and Science.



Medicaid Clinics and Doctors Have Bene Last in Line for COVID-19 Relief Funding is an NPR story by Julie Rovner that calls out how money that was intended to compensate health care providers for the extra costs associated with caring for COVID-19 patients and for the revenue not coming in due to the interruption. But more than half that money has been allocated by the DHHS,

and most so far has gone to hospitals, doctors and other facilities that serve Medicare patients.

#HowAre YouReally? Is a call to action from Ben Miller, chief strategy officer for Well Being Trust, to Congress to increase funding for mental health.

<u>Protecting Our Economy and Health in a Pandemic</u> is a commentary in *Real Clear Politics* by Carol Graham and Ben Miller about how COVID-19 has caused a perfect storm for the global economy, for our societies and for our health. The effects are expected to be felt for generations.

*The U.S. Is Building a Contact-Tracer Army* is a Huffington Post story by Wudan Yan about how as many as 180,00 contact tracers are needed, but how many states face challenges in rapidly scaling up this new workforce.

Strong Social Distancing Measure in the United States Reduced the COVID-19 Growth Rate is an article in Health Affairs by Charles Courtemanche and colleagues whose paper illustrates the potential danger of exponential spread in the absence of interventions, providing relevant information to strategies for restarting economic activity.



<u>Digital prosperity: How broadband can deliver health and equity to all communities</u> is a report posted on the Brookings site by Adie Tomer and colleagues from Brookings Metro and the National Digital Inclusion Alliance who studied the connections between broadband and health and equity.

<u>Telemedicine keeps doctors and patients connected at a safe remove</u> is a story in <u>The Washington Post</u> by Fran Kritz about the advances of health care in a non-face-to-face manner (phone call, email, text, video visit or video email) in the era of COVID-19. Dr. Kyle Knierim of the CU Department of Family Medicine is quoted.

Moderna reports encouraging results from Phase 1 of COVID-19 vaccine trial is a story by Alex Hider for The Denver Channel about promising results from a phase 1 human trial (partnership between Moderna and the NIH) for a coronavirus vaccine.

Drug overdose deaths drop in U.S. as other deaths of despair rise, report finds is a story by Kaitlin Sullivan for NBC News who cites a report that indicates combined deaths from alcohol, drugs and suicide in the U.S. plateaued in 2018, but troubling data suggests that deaths due to alcohol, synthetic opioids, cocaine and suicide increased, particularly among people of color.

<u>Projected Deaths of Despair from COVID-19</u> is a report published by the Well Being Trust and the Robert Graham Center (authors Steve Petterson, Ben Miller, and Jack Westfall) with a cautionary message to not use deaths of despair as the reason to open the country given there was so much that could

have been done about these preventable deaths prior to the pandemic. Using it now for political gain does injustice to the lives lost.

*Primary Care Spending in the United States, 2002-2016* is an article on *JAMA Network* by Drs. Sara Martin, Bob Phillips, and Stephen Petterson who used U.S. health care survey data to assess primary care expenditures relative to other sources of health care spending. Insufficient investment in primary care is one reason that the U.S. health care system continues to under-perform relative to other high-income countries.

<u>These NYC Neighborhoods Have the Highest Rates of Virus Deaths</u> is a story in *The New York Times* by Michael Schwirtz and Lindsey Rogers Cookwho report on new data that shows death rates in each of NYC's zip codes, and underscores the deep disparities already unearthed by the outbreak

The Impact of the COVID-19 Pandemic on Outpatient Visits: A Rebound Emergees Is a story on The Commonwealth Fund site by Ateev Mehrotra and colleagues who update previously reported data showing how the decline in number of ambulatory visits varies by the size of the provider organization.



ABA groups are working to promote and increase medical-legal partnerships is a story on the ABA Journal by Amanda Robert who writes about how the American Bar Association has been an early supporter in MLPs and a key partner for this endeavor.
