Dear Alison,

In the aftermath of the passage of the <u>federal budget resolution</u>, the health policy world is reeling. From cuts to food assistance to the elimination of clean energy tax credits to substantial changes to health care programs, this bill will have far-reaching consequences to Coloradans' health. Cuts in Medicaid will result in loss of coverage for millions of Americans, and Colorado insurers predict a 28% increase in health insurance premiums next year, not including the cost of lost marketplace subsidies.

impacts. Before the bill's passage, we published an op-ed in the Colorado Sun about the importance of protecting Medicaid in our state. Before that, I wrote in Colorado Politics with my colleagues about the damage this will do to rural health care infrastructure. And after its passage, I coauthored a piece in the Conversation about the specifics of the bill, addressing the insufficient stop-gap measure of the newly created Rural Health Transformation Fund. My ongoing work with the Rural Futures collaborative has renewed my commitment to
