[\*A series of recorded webinars\*](#) as part of a learning collaborative to help staff from health centers, primary care associations and health center-controlled networks to learn how organizations can optimize emerging Medicaid payment innovations to develop, launch and sustain activities that address patients' SDOH needs. This learning collaborative was led by the Corporation for Supportive Housing, the National Association of Community Health Centers, and the National Center for Medical-Legal Partnership.

*Report: Findings from the 2016 NCMLP national survey on MLP activities and trends* is a report by Marsha Regenstein and colleagues from the National Center for Medical-Legal Partnership that includes these findings: 1) 1 in 3 health care organizations with active MLPs are now health centers, contributing to an increasingly diverse MLP landscape, 2) 1/3 of health care organizations with MLPs include funding for these activities in their operating budget, 3) in 2016 alone, MLP legal partners collectively trained more than 11,000 health care providers in MLP services and health-harming legal needs, and 4) clinicians reported improved patient health outcomes and greater compliance with medical treatment as a result of MLP services.

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
