<u>Time for Family Medicine to Stop Enabling a Dysfunctional Health Care System</u> is an editorial by Dr. Kurt Stange in *Annals of Family Medicine* that suggests clinicians are burned out by under value and that now is the time to invest in developing primary care that is able to serve as the foundation of an effective, sustainable, and fair health care system.

especially flavored ones like menthol, is not only about nicotine's deadly effects or the impact on local economies. It's about ethics, optics and equity.

Here's what it's all about.</u> is a story in *UCHealth Today* by Todd Neff about a program offered in 66 UCHealth primary care clinics in Colorado and Wyoming designed to help people lose and manage their weight over the long term that is the polar opposite of a fad diet.

<u>The Hidden Link Between Workaholism and Mental Health</u> is a story in *The Atlantic* by Arthur C. Brooks that suggests long hours on the job can temporarily ease the symptoms of depression and anxiety, but how you're better off leaving the office and facing your feelings head on.



The Primary Care Centers Roundtable: Translating Research into Impactful Policy is an article in the *Annals of Family Medicine* by Jennifer DeVoe, Lauren Hughes, Deb Cohen and colleagues about a group of primary care research and policy center directors who have been meeting since 2017 to identify ways how we might better bridge research and policy.

U.S. education chief advocates for more workforce development programs in high schools is a story in *The Colorado Sun* by Erica Breunlin about how Miguel Cardona, U.S. Education Secretary, and Gov. Jared Polis headlined a workforce summit at the Community of College of Aurora where educators and employers explored how to better prepare students for in-demand jobs. And how the 2021 NASEM report, "Implementing High-Quality Primary Care: Rebuilding the Foundation of Health Care has accelerated the Roundtable's efforts.

Judge blocks Colorado age requirements for guns because – wait for it – no one had such a law in 1791 is a story in *The Colorado Sun* by Mike Littwin who suggests that "our right-wing, Trump-McConnell – delivered Supreme Court has been doing all it can to make passing any beneficial gun laws that much harder."

End of affirmative action makes it harder for medical schools to fix community health inequities is a *CPR News* story by Paolo Zialcita about how in a world without affirmative action its absence will mostly be felt among the most selective programs in the nation, including medical schools like the University of Colorado Anschutz School of Medicine.

RESEARCH, DATA, EVALUATION

The Impact of Interpersonal Continuity of Primary Care on Health Care Costs and Use: A Critical Review is a review article by Andrew Bazemore and colleagues in the *Annals of Family Medicine* that summarizes the range of peer-reviewed literature relating continuity to health care costs and use, information critical to assessing the need for continuity measurement in value-based payment design.

Variation in the Ecology of Medical Care is an article published 20 years ago in the *Annals of Family Medicine* by Larry Green, Farley Center scholar, and colleagues that called out how substantial unexplained variation in the ecology of medical care raises important questions about the equity and the effectiveness of the health care system of the United States. And how this model and its variation can continue to inform and stimulate further examination and assessments of the adequacy and appropriateness of health care for all Americans.

<u>COVID-19 Vaccine Strategy Left Small Primary Care Practices on the Sidelines</u> is an article in *Health Affairs* by Shiying Hao and colleagues that reports on the experience of small primary care practices participating in a national clinical registry with COVID-19 vaccines and vaccination data.

MEDICAL-LEGAL PARTNERSHIPS

Environmental Scan of Medical-Legal Partnerships in Health Centers is the report that resulted from the National Center for Medical-Legal Partnership's and the George Washington University's scan of MLPs operating in Federally Qualified Health Centers and look-alike programs (health centers). It explains how these health centers use the MLP approach to increase their capacity to screen patients for health-related legal needs and close the justice gap for low-income and underserved communities.

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
