Can family doctors deliver rural America from its maternal health crisis? is an NPR

story by Sarah Jane Tribble about various ways the federal government is investing money and attention to increase the ranks of clinicians in rural America. Farley Center colleague and associate dean for rural health at the University of Colorado, Dr. Mark Deutchman, was interviewed about Colorado efforts related to the maternal health crisis.

Officials confirm first case of measles in Colorado resident in five years is a story in *The Colorado Sun* by Jennifer Brown and John Ingold about how state health officials are warning unvaccinated people who were at DIA and Children's Hospital that the highly contagious disease can cause brain damage and even death.

Navigating and Communicating about Serious Illness and End of Life is an article in *The New England Journal of Medicine* by Drs. Vicki Jackson and Linda Emanuel about how conversations about prognosis are difficult for patients and clinicians and how clinicians should partner with patients as they integrate prognostic information into goals and end-of-life decisions.

<u>Trusting the Patient: A CU Department of Medicine Leader's Transformational Encounter</u> is a story on the *CU Anschutz News* website by Mark Harden about a story by Dr. Mark Earnest in *The New England Journal of Medicine* about an "odd request" from a patient.



Moving Toward Inclusion: Access to Care Models for Uninsured Immigrant Children is a *Milbank Quarterly* article by Katelyn Girtain and colleagues who discuss existing models that improve access to and delivery of consistent care for immigrant care.

<u>Screening for Housing Needs – Or Preventing Them?</u> is an opinion piece on *The Milbank Quarterly* by Ashley A. Meehan and Joshua M. Sharfstein who point out three ways clinicians and health care organizations can become involved in housing policy to improve social conditions and reduce health disparities.

Getting the Lead Out: The Public Health Benefits of Infrastructure Upgrades is an opinion piece on *The Milbank Quarterly* by Jonathan I. Levy of the Department of Environmental Health at Boston University School of Public Health in which he describes how many infrastructure investments can yield public health benefits and reduce health disparities.

guarantee for all low-income students. It may not coast as much as we think.

<u>Deciding for Patients Who Have Lost Decision-Making Capacity – Finding Common Ground in Medical Ethics</u> is a perspective piece by Dr. Bernard Lo in *The New England Journal of Medicine* about a process of change that shows how our thinking about medical ethics can evolve, and that persons with conflicting philosophical and religious views can reach important agreement.

Colorado wants to hire lawyers to prosecute gun crimes in federal court, some of which are no longer illegal under state law is a story on *The Colorado Sun* by Jesse Paul about how the legislature in recent years rolled back Colorado's blanket prohibition on felons having firearms, but it still exists on the federal level. The state wants to hire lawyers, as Denver and Aurora have done, to fill the prosecutorial void left by the change.



Building High-Performing Primary Care Systems: After a Decade of Policy Change, Is Canada "Walking the Talk?" is a *Milbank Quarterly* article by Monica Aggarwal and colleagues who studied changes over the last decade in policies across 13 Canadian provincial jurisdictions that address the structural features of high-performing primary care systems.

Community Health Center Staff Perspectives on Financial Payments for Social Care is an article on *The Milbank Quarterly* by Justin M. Lopez and colleagues about a study that explored how community health center staff perceive the current and potential influence of fee-for-service payments on clinical team' engagement in these activities.

National Health Care Spending in 2022: Growth Similar to Prepandemic Rates is the Medicare actuaries report in *Health Affairs* by Micah Hartman and colleagues about spending for 2022...incomprehensible amounts of money.

Who is homeless in Denver? Let's look at the numbers. is a post on *The Colorado Sun* by Jennifer Brown and Kevin Jeffers about how more than 9,000 people are either sleeping on the streets or in shelters, a number that doesn't include the growing number of immigrants.

Study Provides New Insight into Low Social Determinants of Health Screening Rates is a post on the *CU Anschutz Medical Campus* website by Julie Milzer about how research details differences in Medicaid and commercially insured health plans.

Why Older Men Are Killing themselves at Alarming Rates is a story about a CDC report posted on *AARP* by Sharon Jayson about how more than half of deaths by suicide are among adults 45 years or older. And how firearm-related suicide was more common in older men.
