Dr. Farmer, the pioneer and champion of global health and a practitioner of social medicine, raised millions of dollars and provided quality health care to some of the world's poorest people. <u>Commission</u> is a summary in *The Lancet* by Prof. Helen Herman and colleagues about the importance of depression that includes prevention.

Mental health after COVID-19 is an editorial on *The BMJ* site by Scott Weich that discusses COVID risks and how it's time to learn and respond.

The COVID-19 Pandemic: COVID-19 is in retreat in Colorado but stay tuned? is this week's commentary from Dr. Jon Samet about the lull in the pandemic and the hope for a healthy spring.

Ads Contributed to Hooking Black Smokers on Menthols. Now CU Experts Are Fighting Back is a story on the CU Anschutz site by Laura Veith about how the Colorado School of Public Health rallies community partnership to reverse years of deadly social injustice.

<u>Widespread Misinformation about Infertility Continues to Create COVID-19</u>
<u>Vaccine Hesitancy</u> is a perspective piece on *JAMA* by Jennifer Abbasi, which suggests that trusted physicians can change patients' minds and help to halt the spread of misinformation.



Stabilizing Health Care's Share of the GDP is an opinion piece in *The New England Journal of Medicine* by Dr. Jonathan Skinner and colleagues who write how their research demonstrated that nearly all wage and salary increases between 1999 and 2009 for the median-income American worker were absorbed by increases in health care premiums, out-of-pocket expenses, and taxes for fund Medicare and Medicaid, which has resulted in little left over for discretionary purchases or savings.

<u>Ten things you need to know about the Health and Care Billis</u> a brief posted on *The BMJ* by Tom Moberly, UK editor, that characterizes proposed reforms of the UK's NHS, which reveals many challenges like those in the United States at clinical and political levels.

Implementing the 988 Hotline: A Critical Window to Decriminalize Mental Health is an article in Health Affairs by Polina Krass and colleagues who caution that with inadequate preparation, the rollout of 988 has huge implications for public trust.

Pandemic's mental health crisis shows California needs to reinvent health care is an opinion piece on the *Desert Sun* by Shruti Kothari and Chris Koller who address the issue of reimagining health care in California, a plan already in

development before COVID was a thing.

The Stumbling Block to One of the Most Promising Police Reforms is an article in *The Atlantic* by David A. Graham who discusses how the best mental-health responders in the world can help only if emergency dispatchers know when to deploy them.

Racism & Health in US Medicine: A conversation with Harriet A. Washington Health Affairs is a 30-minute YouTube vide in which the history of racism in medicine and research is discussed.



Association Between Hospice Enrollment and Total Health Care Costs for Insurers and Families, 2002-2018 is an article on JAMA Network by Dr. Melissa D. Aldridge and colleagues in which the authors reported that hospice use by community-dwelling Medicare beneficiaries was associated with significantly lower total health care costs across all payers in the last three days to last three months of life in their cohort study

\$76 million could fix Colorado's youth mental health system, study finds as kids are sent out of state for care is a story in *The Colorado Sun* by Jennifer Brown who writes about signs that point to the failure of Colorado's youth residential treatment centers without more funding. A coalition that includes the treatment centers, Children's Hospital Colorado, and county human service directors are lobbying to get lawmakers and Gov. Polis to act on a study that found it would cost \$76 million to fully fund Colorado's residential centers for children with severe mental health needs.

State-Level Social and Economic Policies and their Association with Perinatal and Infant Outcomes is an article on the *Milbank Memorial Fund* site by Jessica L. Webster and colleagues that discusses how these study findings: state-level social and economic policies that expand tax credits, increased paid parental leave, raising the minimum wage, and increased tobacco taxes were shown to reverse perinatal and infant health outcomes.

<u>Program helps primary care practices expand access to opioid use disorder treatment</u> is a post on *Helio* that describes a multilevel program, co-directed by Linda Zittleman and designed to provide support and resources to rural primary care practices, and how it showed an increase in buprenorphine prescriptions.

Research America: January National Survey Results includes results from a public opinion survey and a graphic depiction of how mental health has overtaken cancer as a top three health concern.

<u>Urgent Response</u> is an article in *Pediatrics* by Dr. Ruth Shim and colleagues that shows high rates of mental health disorders among U.S. children and youth, including evidence that even very young children experience mental health conditions.

## MEDICAL-LEGAL PARTNERSHIPS

Advancing Action on Health Equity through a Sociolegal Model of Health is an article on the *Milbank Memorial Fund* site by Ashley Schram and colleagues who suggest that health providers can use the law more strategically in the pursuit of health and equity by addressing governance challenges, employing a broader rights-based discourse in the public health policy process, and collaborating with the access to justice movement.

When Everyone Benefits: Exploring the Roles of Health Care Providers in Law Enforcement Reform, Crisis Assistance, and Public Policy on Unsheltered Homelessness is a free, virtual symposium April 6<sup>th</sup> 10AM-1:30PM MT to explore the future of public safety and the intersecting issues of unsheltered homelessness, criminalization, crisis response, street outreach, and health care.

White House Applauds Anti-Eviction Program is a story on the University of Maryland Baltimore site by Laura Lee about how this school is one of 99 law schools recently recognized during a virtual White House and Department of Justice event for responding to AG Merrick Garland's call to action to address a looming housing and eviction crisis.

Public Health Strategies: A Pathway for Public Health Practice to Leverage Law in Advancing Equity is an article in the Journal of Public Health Management & Practice by Samantha Bent Weber and Matthew Penn that outlines a pathway for public health departments and practitioners to incorporate law into their efforts to advance equity in health outcomes.
