<u>Pregnant people with substance use disorders need treatment, not criminalization</u> is an opinion piece on *STAT* by Nora D. Volkow who cites various research findings including a 2022 analysis that found women living in states with punitive policies for substance use in pregnancy had a lower likelihood of receiving timely or quality care, both before and after pregnancy.

Almost half of children who go to ER with mental health crisis don't get the follow-up care they need, study finds is a post on CNN Health by Jen Christensen about study findings that showed fewer than a third of the children (n=28,000) aged 6 to 17 years had the benefit of an outpatient mental health visit within seven days of being discharged from the ER.
