Wakeman about how critical services offered by bridge clinics to those in outpatient settings with substance use disorders are not consistently reimbursable under a fee-for-service payment model.

<u>Reduction, and Medications</u> is video in *The New England Journal of Medicine*by Dr. Sarah Bagley and colleagues in which they review how primary care
providers can best care for patients with opioid use disorder.



Colorado is keeping kids locked in juvenile jails months longer than needed because of lack of foster homes, treatment options is a story in *The Colorado Sun* by Jennifer Brown about how legislation calls for \$25 million to expand behavioral health treatment and therapeutic foster care for kids and teens.

DEA confiscated record amount of fentanyl in 2023, more than 2.6 million pills in Colorado is a post on *The Colorado Sun* by Olivia Prentzel about how fentanyl is now the leading cause of death for Americans between the ages of 18 and 45 according to the Drug Enforcement Administration.

Toward a Climate-Ready Health Care System: Institutional Motivators and Workforce Engagement is an article in *The Milbank Quarterly* by Caleb Dresser and colleagues who suggest that policies must address institutional barriers to change and create incentives aligned with climate readiness goals, and that institutions and individuals can support climate change readiness by integrating

content on the health care implications of climate change into educational curricula.

A public-private program has helped Colorado's toughest foster kids get adopted. Now the state is cutting its funding. is a story in *The Colorado Sun* by Jennifer Brown about the Wendy's Wonderful Kids program that uses special caseworkers who scour foster children's files for long-lost relatives, former coaches or anyone who might want to adopt them. Funding for this six-year program is not included in next year's proposed budget.

Ten health policy challenges for the next 10 years is an article in *Health Affairs Scholar* by Kathryn A. Phillips and the rest of the journal editorial team who focus on issues that are traditionally studied by health services researchers such as cost, access, and quality, but then examine emerging and intersectional topics: equity, income, and justice; technology, pharmaceuticals, markets, and innovation; population health; and global health.

<u>Unlocking the potential of technology-driven solutions in Medicaid</u>is an article in *Health Affairs* by Kate Paris, vice president of policy and advocacy, UnitedHealthcare Community & State, about <u>a report</u> that address barriers to implementation such as the insufficient funding, staffing limitations and administrative restrictions.



First-of-its-kind study tests to see if psychedelics can help treat depression a 9 News story by Kelly Reinke about a study set to launch this month at CU Anschutz to test if psychedelics can help people cope with depression.

New Research Shows Mobile Methadone Units are Most Impactful in Rural Areas is a post on the CU Anschutz Medical Campus site by Julia Milzer that indicates new research that highlights the importance of expanding access to opioid treatments in remote locations.

Nearly half of Colorado adults live in a home with a gun, survey finds a 9 News story by Kevin Vaughan about how these results will be used to help guide efforts to prevent injuries and deaths.

Colorado has the nation's third-longest waitlist for people charged with crimes and ordered into psychiatric treatment is an article in *The Colorado Sun* by Jennifer Brown about how Colorado has for years been short on in-patient psychiatric beds for people with severe mental illness, creating a backlog that means people wait months for care and sit in jail instead of a hospital. The number of state-run psychiatric beds for people who are civilly committed or

ordered by the criminal justice system shrunk by 20% in seven years, according to a new report.

Young Colorado renters need to choose if they'll pay the landlord, the hospital or grandma is a story in *The Colorado Sun* by Erica Bruenlin about how a tenant who earns minimum wage would have to work 77 hours per week to afford a one-bedroom apartment at fair market rent.



Learning Collaborative: Medical-Legal Partnership to Improve Maternal Health Access and Outcomes will provide training/technical assistance to empower participants with a deeper understanding of how the social determinants of health impact maternal health, which begins April 2, 11am-12:30pm MT.
