Will your older self refuse to give up the car keys? Here's how to plan is a story in *The Washington Post* by Judith Graham about how an "advance directive" for driving is a tool that can help seniors and their loved ones.

Long COVID patients enduring symptoms, looking for answers is a post in *Scripps News* by Clayton Sandell about how over the last year, nearly 15% of adults infected with COVID-19 reported symptoms lasting longer than three months.

<u>Tips for quitting smoking in the New Year</u> is a 3-minute interview with Jan Lowery, assistant director for dissemination and implementation at the CU Cancer Center, regarding a partnership with a company called Tomorrow

Health, a digital health company that has developed a smart phone program to help people overcome their addiction to nicotine.

<u>Safe</u> is a perspective video piece in *The New England Journal of Medicine* by Dr. Sarah Bagley and colleagues that reviews available medications for opioid use disorder and their mechanisms, and emphasizes that multiple types of health care providers, including those in primary care, can manage and treat opioid use disorder.

Beyond Moral Injury – Can We Reclaim Agency, Belief, and Joy in Medicine?is an article in *The New England Journal of Medicine* by Dr. Lisa Rosenbaum that addresses how the system quashes well-being, the individual's role in reclaiming joy, and whether it's still possible for the necessary sacrifices to feel worthwhile.

Can the 'Dopamine Detox' Trend Break a Digital Addiction? is a Q & A piece posted on the *CU Anschutz Medical Campus* site by Debra Melani with Emily Hemendinger, MPH, LCSW, assistant professor in the CU Department of Psychiatry, about how the Dopamine detox is misleading and not helpful, but rather another fad that people in the wellness industry are trying to make money from.

<u>CU Doctor Works to Increase HPV Vaccine Uptake to Prevent Cervical</u>
<u>Cancer.</u> is a story on the *University of Colorado Cancer Center* site by Greg
Glasgow about how Dr. Sean O'Leary is involved in projects including lowering vaccination age and engaging rural communities.



Many teens are rethinking college. This 87-acre campus near Colorado Springs wants to help them find careers without it. is a story in *The Colorado Sun* by Erica Breunlin about how superintendents want to build an education park where they can explore vocational training and job certifications as student interest surges in careers that don't require a college degree, including those in the medical service area.

Stopping the Vicious Cycle: Equitable Enforcement Strategies to Achieve Safe, Stable, and Accessible Housing for People with Disabilities is an article on *The Milbank Quarterly* by Katie Hannon Michel of ChangeLab Solutions and colleagues that discusses how the underenforcement of laws designed to provide safe and accessible housing, such as housing safety codes and anti-discrimination laws, and the overenforcement of punitive laws, such nuisance ordinances and evictions, contribute to the problem. The authors recommend

that policymakers focus on equitable enforcement of housing laws.

<u>Transforming Population Health – ARPA-H's New Program Targeting Broken Incentives</u> is a perspective piece in *The New England Journal of Medicine* by Drs. Darshak Sanghavi and Dawn Alley in which the authors suggest that new approaches to financing illness prevention are desperately needed. Lack of incentives for implementing prevention-focused approaches result in the U.S. health care system failing to deliver effective interventions to the people who need them most.

How hard is it for rural Colorado hospitals to hire CEOs? Ask the 24-year-old boss at the medical center in Julesburg. is a story in *The Colorado Sun* by Gabrielle Porter about how the turnover among top managers of critical access hospitals in Colorado is double that of the nation. It's a tough job, some say, even in cities with plenty of resources and mentors.

Colorado officials thought they had 3 more years to spend \$1.5B in federal COVID aid. They have 11 months. is a story in *The Colorado Sun* by Brian Eason about how state officials blame the time crunch on shifting guidance from the U.S. Treasury Department.



Palliative Care Works, Even When Delivered by Phone is a post on Health Day by Dennis Thompson about a CU School of Medicine study led by Dr. David Bekelman, which showed that patients saw improvements in depression, anxiety and quality of life after regular calls made by a nurse and social worker, with improvements lasting months after the program concluded.

Advancing Patient Safety: A Call for System Transformation is an opinion piece in *The Milbank Quarterly* by Kushal T. Kadakia and Harlan M. Krumholz that discusses a 2023 report from the President's Council of Advisors on Science and Technology calling for a <u>national initiative to advance patient safety</u>. The authors offer guidance to policymakers and practitioners on how best to implement the report's recommendations.
