Polis to veto HB 1190 aimed at increasing affordable housing options across the state, and he did.

Why a showdown over Jared Polis' big health insurance reform program fizzled – and what it means. is a post in *The Colorado Sun* by John Ingold about how public hearings over prices for Colorado Option plans were supposed to kick off this week, but the first one was cancelled.

New Medicaid Proposed Rules Focus on Primary Care is an issue brief posted on the *Milbank Memorial Fund* site by Lauryn Walker about how the Biden-Harris administration rules focus on primary care and equity for beneficiaries, setting a maximum wait time for routine primary care and requiring states to enforce wait times and maintain provider directory accuracy, publication of payment rates, and development of a public-facing webpage for required reports. Training the Primary Care Workforce to Deliver Team-Based Care in Underserved Areas: The Teaching Health Center Program is a report published on the *Milbank Memorial Fund* site by Emily Hawes and colleagues about the Teaching Health Center Graduate Medical Education program that is a model designed to align health workforce training with population health needs. The authors emphasize that long-term financial uncertainty undermines the sustainability of teaching health centers.

<u>Youth Mental Wellness Survey Report (August 2019)</u> contains the results of a Canadian youth mental wellness survey done a few years back, prior to COVID.



Medical-Legal Partnership in Primary Care: Moving Upstream in the Clinic is a review article in the *American Journal of Lifestyle in Medicine* by Elizabeth Tobin Tyler that describes the MLP approach to addressing the SDH, examines its benefits for improving the delivery of primary care for vulnerable patients and populations, and explores new opportunities for MLP with the advent of systems reforms driven by the ACA.

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
