COVID-19 Research in the News: What Ethical Issues Does This Raise? is the title of the 11th Annual CCTSI Research Ethics Conference November 4th, noon to 3PM MT that will examine the pandemic and misinformation and features a panel of experts.

Increasing Access to Medications for Opioid Use Disorder: Policy Strategies

During and After COVID-19 Pandemic is an issue brief posted on the Milbank

Memorial Fund by Caroline M. Au-Yeung and colleagues that suggests that
policymakers should: 1) make permanent important policy changes put in
place during the pandemic that have improved access to medications for opioid
use disorder, and 2) maintain pandemic policies that have increased access to
medications for opioid use disorder by addressing service delivery, medicationprescribing authority, dispensing rules, prescriptions and refill parameters, and
more.
