### Pot Use Appears to Change Structure of Your Heart: Study

It could be the smoke that's being inhaled that places strain on the heart, or it could be THC, the chemical in pot that gets you high, said **Larry Allen**, a professor of cardiology at the CU School of Medicine. THC has been shown to increase heart rate and blood pressure, cause blood to clot more easily, and affect the inner lining of blood vessels, he said. "We have some basic laboratory data that suggests there may be adverse health effects of THC," Allen said.

After analyzing nearly 10,000 cannabis-related cases from 2012 to 2016 at UCHealth University of Colorado Hospital in Aurora, Colorado, researchers [from the CU School of Medicine] found there was a higher number of visits associated with edible use than expected. Recreational pot was made legal in the state in 2014.



#### **Vitamin D Supplementation Offers No Benefit for Critically III**

**Adit A. Ginde**, from the University of Colorado in Aurora, and colleagues randomly assigned critically ill, vitamin D-deficient patients at high risk for death to receive either a single enteral dose of 540,000 IU of vitamin  $D_3$  or matched placebo within 12 hours after the decision to admit the patient to an intensive care unit. A total of 1,360 patients were randomly assigned; 1,078 had baseline vitamin D deficiency confirmed by subsequent testing and were included in the primary analysis population.
