“Well, what I would really like to study is the antibody response and the maturity of the antibody response,” said **Kim Jordan**, an immunologist at the University of Colorado Anschutz campus who is helping to find answers about the virus’ unique behavior.... To learn some basic biology about this new coronavirus, patient samples have to get into research labs. The CU Anschutz campus has a lab — the [Human Immunology and Immunotherapy Lab](#) — that was collecting samples from patients with cancer before the pandemic.
