
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<u>169 Students Graduate From University Of Colorado School Of</u> Medicine



In an article published in May in *Diabetes Technology & Therapeutics*, Peters and **Satish K. Garg**, professor of medicine and pediatrics at the Barbara Davis Center for Diabetes, University of Colorado [Anschutz Medical Campus], wrote that the switch to 90-day medication supplies for people with diabetes — along with removing the barrier to drive to a clinic for a prescription — has directly influenced outcomes and reduced incidence of diabetic ketoacidosis.
