“When it comes to our immune system’s ability to fight things long-term, the antibodies are key,” stated **Ashley Frazer-Abel**, assistant professor from University of Colorado School of Medicine at the CU Anschutz Medical Campus.



“One of the things that makes it special is that we’re testing for two different proteins on the virus,” explained **Brian Harry**, a pathologist from University of Colorado School of Medicine.

In April, **Abbey Lara** [associate professor of medicine at CU School of Medicine] worked her first shift treating pulmonary and critical care patients in the COVID-19 section of the ICU ward at University of Colorado Hospital in Aurora.
