“Our world has gone through a really terrifying and scary event, and our kids are aware of that,” said **Jenna Glover**, Clinical Child Psychologist and Director of Children’s Psychology Training at Children’s Hospital Colorado [and associate professor of psychiatry at CU School of Medicine]. “If we don’t talk to them directly about that, oftentimes it leads to increased feelings of fear and uncertainty, and increased worry.”

**Amy Feldman**, director of the liver transplant program at Children's Hospital Colorado [and associate professor of pediatrics at CU School of Medicine], said when a child comes in with signs of hepatitis, they check for those risk factors — other than heavy drinking, which isn't relevant for kids — as well as genetic conditions that can harm the liver.

### [Colorado Researchers Working Toward A Cure For Type 1 Diabetes](#)

"We can directly observe the interactions between different types of immune cells within the disease site," said **Rachel Friedman**, Associate Professor at the Barbara Davis Center and the Department of Immunology & Microbiology at the University of Colorado Anschutz School of Medicine.



In order to cure Type 1 diabetes, the mistaken immune response has to be stopped. **Jordan Jacobelli** is working on that intervention. He's also an Associate Professor at the Barbara Davis Center and the Department of Immunology & Microbiology at the University of Colorado Anschutz School of Medicine. "We're trying to understand how the cells of the immune system move throughout the body," he explained.
