
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


Introduction


- Survivors of GSWs face structural barriers to receiving high quality post-discharge care

- Little is known about why patients require post-GSW ED care and who is most affected



• <u>Study aim:</u> describe factors associated with repeat visits to the ED following a firearm-related injury

Conclusions

- Top reasons: pain control, post-op complications, other (misc. injury-related sx), wound check, and wound infections
- Suggests many visits and/or readmissions are preventable
- Disproportionate impact on vulnerable populations
- Proposed solutions:
 - Home wound care kits, robust discharge pain control instructions and contingency planning, routine Psychiatry consults
