5 KEY TAKEAWAYS

Find Common Ground

- Actively seek similarities with all learners, particularly those who may not share your background.
- Avoid favoring learners who remind you of yourself.
- Use patient care as a shared goal to connect with learners.

Focus on Observable Behaviors, Not Personal Traits

- Prioritize specific actions and observed skills over subjective attributes.
- Avoid assessing learners based on how well they "fit in."
- Use tools like your phone's notes app to track behavioral observations for later use.

Practice Perspective-Taking in Feedback

- Consider how your feedback will be received by the learner.
- Reflect on how you would respond if you received the same feedback.
- Ensure your words and perceptions aren't shaped by bias.
- Recognize that your intent may not always align with the impact of your feedback.

Pause to Evaluate Bias

• Regularly question whether bias is influencing your assessments.

• Ask yourself, "Would I write the same feedback if the learner were a different gender or race?" to ensure fairness and objectivity.

Actively Counter Stereotypes

- Watch for stereotypes that may creep into your assessments.
- Pause to consider counter-stereotypic examples before completing feedback.
- Challenge assumptions by recalling successful professionals from similar backgrounds.
