


I remember having my mind blown with this one - ANONYMOUS


As a white person this podcast helped me to see how white people focus and draw away from the issues people of color face







### How should we select the media and topics we cover?




I'll text Heather when I hear a great story on NPR that talks about a relevant book/podcast/etc. — ANONYMOUS
