“I knew going into medical school that I wanted to be happy at the end of the day. I didn’t want to be a doctor who was doing it just because I had the degree and kept practicing, just because. I wanted to enjoy going to work and then come home feeling fulfilled in what I was doing.

Going into med school and medicine, I always knew I was going to do primary care. That was where my love was. I didn’t know if that would look like: primary care in obstetrics, primary care in internal medicine, or pediatrics, but I knew it would be primary care. I found family medicine in my first year of medical school and realized I could do it all, literally. I went to the family medicine conference after my first year of medical school and it’s one of the most life changing experiences you can have— I’ve never met so many people who were so passionate about something in their own ways. You go to all these different lectures, the never ending expo hall, that housed the many different residency programs across the nation. I literally didn’t meet anyone who was not enjoying what they were doing in family medicine. Everyone wanted to talk to you and tell you what they loved about family medicine. So I fell in love with it there, because I met so many people who I could see myself working with and I realized how versatile family medicine was which was something I wanted in my practice.

Then, I realized I wanted to do rural family medicine, which is even more particular. I did some electives in rural towns and a few different Native American reservations and realized that family medicine was really valued in these areas. Those doctors were so incredible because they use the limited resources they have and can do things ten times more than what can be done in a big city. They’ve gotten used to doing it with what they have and making the best out of the situation. I kept telling myself “wow, they’re superhuman in what they’re doing”. Even when working a little more, or not getting paid as

much as a specialist, they still love what they are doing every day. I think rural medicine incorporates a lot of community medicine. You are such a valued member of the community—you are involved in the school system and lots of different non healthcare activities. I just love that. I want to practice somewhere that I'm involved in the community and that is a valued part of my profession. Family medicine gives you that.” - Shawnecca Burke, MD
