Why I chose Family Medicine

"Family Medicine is rarely chosen based off a single experience. Rather, it's an accumulation of events that leads medical students to choosing the specialty.

I've known that primary care would likely be the specialty for me ever since I was a CNA, a position which helped lay the foundation for my personal values in health care. These patients were incredibly ill and often required intimate and personal care. In this setting, success meant developing strong trusting relationships

with both patients and their families – learning the amazing stories that went beyond their medical condition. I realized at this point that if I entered medicine, I wanted the specialty that would allow me to hear the amazing life stories that people carry.

One of the most important aspects of medicine for me is being a role model for the community. One reason why I love Family Medicine is that the specialty requires the provider to be heavily involved with their surrounding community. I love knowing that as a doctor, I will have the opportunity to both represent and care for my surrounding community.

Going through my clinical years further cemented in my mind that Family Medicine was the calling for me. OBGYN, Pediatrics, Internal & Family Medicine; these clinical experiences made me realize that I could never enjoy medicine without elements of each of these specialties. More importantly, I realized I needed to have a diverse population to care for. I can never give up my geriatric population, my patients going through pregnancy, or the children who I would get to see grow up. These clinical rotations also made me realize that I must have continuity with my patients. I want to be a constant for them; an anchor that each of these patients can rely on for care."
