A Quick Commentary

Community: The Heart of Family Medicine. Written by: Santina Wheat, MD, MPH

Summary:

Family physicians not only care for individuals, but care for communities. This makes it critical that community engagement be at the core of family medicine residency training. Involving residents in community engagement efforts will allow them to improve health outcomes through effective population-based initiatives. The author proposes that *Community* should be included as the fifth “C” of residency training, and that it should follow three recommendations for incorporation.

1. The first is defining a community, which will allow residents to understand the needs of the communities they are serving.
2. The second is evaluating the needs of the community and enacting efforts to address those needs.
3. The third is evaluating the effectiveness of the resident in engaging with the community and addressing their particular needs.

Overall, placing a focus on community during family medicine residency is key, as it will offer opportunities for residents to understand that community work really is the heart of family medicine.
