Stimulating Access to Research in Residency (StARR) Program Accepting Applications

The Departments of Medicine, Pediatrics and Surgery are now recruiting for the **Residency Research StARR Program - Stimulating Access to Research in Residency**.

The mission of the StARR Program is to recruit, train and retain outstanding clinician-investigators focused on research related to heart, lung and blood disorders. **Flexibility is built into the program** with the ability to accommodate a variety of interests - bench, translational or clinical research.

Who should apply?

- Medicine, Medicine-Pediatrics, and Pediatrics Residents starting either PGY-2 or PGY-3
- Surgery Residents 6-12 months prior to their research training

Program Benefits

- StARR scholars are eligible for NIH Loan Repayment up to \$50,000 annually
- **\$20,000 available** per StARR scholar for research development, workshops, conferences, and career development
- StARR scholars are more competitive for fellowships and future NIH funding (K38 and other career development awards)

- The **Hopkins GIM Housestaff Research Awards Program**, now in its 18th year, is soliciting applications. The Division of General Internal Medicine will make awards to **housestaff** who are interested in careers in academic general internal medicine and have conducted outstanding research in any of the following five broad areas:
 - o Behavioral medicine and health disparities;
 - o Bioethics;
 - Evidence-based healthcare and systematic reviews;
 - Health services and outcomes research;
 - Medical education.

Awards to residents carry a cash prize of \$500 prize plus travel and lodging. Awardees will attend a dinner with GIM faculty on **Thursday, December 14, 2023**, then present winning abstracts during a special GIM Grand Rounds held on **Friday, December 15, 2023**. - Building off a recent four million dollar grant to the CU School of Medicine for the

 Violence Prevention projects at DH and the University of Colorado School of
 Medicine currently ongoing. There are multiple opportunities to get involved in both
 gun violence research and translation to patient care. Specifically, there are projects
 involving:
 - Literature/policy analysis to determine evidence-based intervention strategies at DH/UCH
 - Implementation of a lock box program at DH
 - o Buildout of an inter-hospital gun violence prevention forum
 - o Provider education on evidence-based intervention programs.



- R2/R3s will be reviewing community engagement and handoffs in the coming months, will summarize discussions in the next newsletters.


Anonymous Reporting: Thank you all for using the <u>anonymous reporting link</u> on our webpage. For those who have not used this feature, you can <u>click here</u> to report anything at all to the program. We welcome and encourage and prefer direct feedback to the chiefs, to your class leaders, and our program leadership...but we know that sometimes none of that feels right and you would like to stay completely anonymous but still need us to know about something that has occurred. We get it. Issues reported here go directly to Dr. Connors and are completely unidentifiable. In an effort to close the loop on these reports – as best as we can do without knowing the reporter and while respecting privacy – we will use this section each month to let you know what is happening with anonymously reported issues.

Microaggressions and Harrassment: Thank you to everyone who reported Microaggression or Harassment events last year. The only way we can continue to make change is if we continue to hear from you. We heard of 116 microaggression or harassment events last academic year. Below is the data in terms of type of event and clinical site. We get the majority of this information from the rotation evaluations (which as a reminder are NOT anonymous) but as a reminder you can also share any concerns with us through your CMRs/APDs/PD, through the anonymous reporting portal on the front page of the heartbeat, or through the resident and faculty confidential liaisons.

At Denver Health, we continue to have regular meetings with nursing and hospital leadership. There is new nursing leadership at DH who we hope to partner with moving forward. At the VA, we have an ambulatory task force working to address patient events and increase upstander training for ambulatory attendings. We continue to target attending to resident events at the University and have engaged the Office of Professionalism to help us work with attendings who have repeated events. There is going to be a new faculty development series that will include upstander training and hope to have this become a mandatory training for reaching faculty moving forward.

Thank you to everyone for the continued feedback regarding Microaggressions and Harassment. For anyone who reported events through the anonymous portal, please know that your concerns were received. So far in 23-24, we have received 15 reports. 6 from DH, 4 from the VA and 5 from UCH. 5 were regarding patient interactions, 10 were from nurses/staff or colleagues, and 2 involved an attending. We continue our efforts to have all teaching faculty get upstander training. We continue to work on our efforts in the DH ICU to improve relations with nursing and staff. We appreciate all the residents who have been upstanders for their peers. You are leading the charge in ensuring a safe training environment.
