Marking the Retirement of Donna McGregor: A Career Dedicated to Advancing HIV Care and Global Health

After years of remarkable service and dedication, we join in celebrating Donna McGregor, NP, MSN as she embarks on her well-earned retirement. Donna's contributions have greatly impacted both our team and the many patients she has served.

Donna McGregor is a licensed board-certified adult nurse practitioner with a graduate degree in Nursing, specializing in primary care and HIV/AIDS with post-graduate training in Women's Health and Tropical Medicine. After working in the fields of OB/GYN, Intensive Care, and Physical Medicine and Rheumatology for 18 years after college graduation, Donna completed her graduate training and started her career in Infectious Disease at Northwestern University in Chicago in 2001. During her time at Northwestern, she provided HIV primary and specialty care for hundreds of patients, worked with the ACTG clinical trials program, and established the HIV PrEP program. She was awarded several HIV research grants and co-authored multiple articles and abstracts. She is particularly proud of grant programs which brought progestin IUD's to HIV+ women at University of Ibadan Hospital in Nigeria, a postpartum loss to follow up program for HIV+ women, and a community-academic partnership program for improving HIV Outcomes in female torture survivors.

She also served as an HIV/AIDS consultant/lecturer for various U.S. and international groups, including the CDC Global Aids Program and the U.S. PEPFAR program, and contributed to HIV education and health resource capacity building in Nigeria, Tanzania, and Cambodia. In 2010, she volunteered with the International Medical Corps assisting in the emergency response for the Cholera epidemic in Haiti.

In 2016, Donna completed postgraduate training in Tropical Medicine and Travel with the CDC and University of Minnesota and earned certification with the American Society of Tropical Medicine and Hygiene.

She joined the University of Colorado Division of Infectious Diseases in June 2017 to assist with HIV PrEP programming as well as HIV clinical care. During her time at CU, she has helped to develop the CU Telemedicine PrEP program and was awarded an investigator-initiated grant with Gilead Sciences, Inc. to use telemedicine to reduce disparities in rural HIV prevention throughout Colorado. In 2023, the PrEP team presented their findings at ID Week in Boston, "Elevated HIV Risk/Low Risk Perception in Rural Colorado".

Going forward, Donna hopes to participate in international volunteer work, finally become a good cross country skier and learn to play mahjong. She is looking forward to world travel and spending more time with her daughters in New Jersey and Minnesota.

The TB Trot has long since been retired but Amy continued to grow her knowledge and passion for helping people impacted by TB. She did an internship in the World Health Organization's Stop TB Department, Green Light Committee. She then worked as a Public Service Fellow for Partners in Health in Lima, Peru monitoring field work for a study on "Epidemiology and

Transmission Dynamics of Multidrug-Resistant and Extensively Drug-Resistant TB in Peru," and interviewing people with HIV for a study on "Community-Based Accompaniment with Supervised Antiretrovirals". As a Doris Duke International Clinical Research Fellow, she worked in Tugela Ferry, KwaZulu-Natal, South Africa providing training and support for community health workers and participating in supervised clinical care at a referral center for multidrug-resistant TB.

Amy did her residency in Internal Medicine/Pediatrics through the University of Colorado and then joined the CDC as an Epidemic Intelligence Service (EIS) Officer. She began working at Denver Health and with the TB Clinic last fall. She is appreciated for her compassion, excellence in patient care since, and thoughtful approach to challenges. Joshua Barocas Awarded Multiple Grants for Research on HIV, Opioid Use, and Homelessness



Josh Barocas recently received an R01 award from National Institute on Drug Abuse (NIDA) for his project entitled "The Improving Health and Housing Outcomes through a Simulation and Economic (iHOUSE) Model". This grant will fund the development of an agent-based model to simulate the dynamic processes influencing HIV incidence, overdose, and life expectancy among individuals along the housing and homelessness continuum of care in Denver, CO, and San Francisco, CA.

Additionally, Josh is a co-investigator on another R01 project,
"TRANSFORM – Transforming the Evidence Base on Estimating
Prevalence of Opioid Use Disorder and Expanded Access to Interventions
to Prevent Drug-Related Deaths: An International Data Linkage Study"
involving researchers from Australia, the UK, and the US.

Josh also received a grant from Caring for Denver to study the impact of peer support specialists on individuals experiencing homelessness with substance use disorders. Congratulations to Josh!

Kristine Erlandson Awarded NIH R01 Grant and Community Engagement Pilot Award



In addition, Kristine and her mentee, Evelyn Iriarte Parra, were awarded a community engagement pilot grant through the CCTSI. Their project, in collaboration with community partner Lupe Joyner, is titled "Building a Partnership to Improve HIV Prevention and Care among Latino Communities in Colorado". Congratulations to Mario Santiago and Cara Wilson for receiving an exploratory/developmental NIH R21 Grant titled, "The Public Mucosal Antibody Repertoire in HIV-1 Infection". The 2-year study will aim to reconstruct and characterize the functional properties of a unique and mysterious group of antibodies in the gut that were commonly found in persons with or without HIV-1 infection, particularly in relation to inflammation and the microbiome. The work will be performed with Coinvestigators and collaborators in the Department of Medicine which include Dan Frank, Steph Dillon, Kejun Guo, Edward Janoff and Kristi Kuhn.


