Honoring Dr. Steven Johnson's Remarkable Career in Infectious Diseases

Dr. Steven Johnson is retiring from the University of Colorado School of Medicine on October 31, 2025. While Dr. Johnson will conclude his clinical work at the University of Colorado Hospital and the HIV Outreach Clinics, he will continue to share his expertise through periodic lectures locally and nationally in his new role as Professor Emeritus.

Dr. Johnson has had a remarkable career and an enduring impact on our division, our institution, the state of Colorado, nationally, and within the specialty of infectious diseases overall. He earned his MD at Northwestern University Medical School (1980-1984) funded by an Army scholarship, then completed his Internal Medicine Residency at Fitzsimons Army Medical Center (1984–1987) and his ID Fellowship at Walter Reed Army Medical Center (1987–1990). From 1990–1994, he served as a staff physician at Walter Reed, where he was an HIV provider, ID consultant, Chair of Infection Control, and Co-Director of the TB Clinic.

He was recruited to CU in 1994 and led the Infectious Disease Group Practice and HIV Clinical Program until 2016. Among his many accomplishments in the CU clinical space, he expanded the HIV program, launched the OPAT program, acquired the Travel Clinic, relocated the IDGP to Anschutz, and developed many outpatient initiatives, including Transplant ID, body fluid exposure management, and Hepatitis C treatment. Perhaps most importantly, Steve directed the Ryan White Part A program throughout his tenure, securing \$27 million in competitive grant funding over 32 years. He also served on the City of Denver's Ryan White Planning Council and the Governor's AIDS Council.

Steve has made a profound impact across the state—empowering healthcare providers through training and expanding access to care for patients in remote areas. Steve played a key role in launching Ryan White Part C-funded HIV clinics in Grand Junction and Durango (2000), traveling monthly for 25 years until June 2024. In 2003, he was instrumental in developing the Ryan White Part C-funded HIV collaborative clinic at the Pueblo Community Health Center. He provided consultations, including monthly on-site clinics, for 22 years until September of 2025. In 2013, he helped establish the Ryan

White Part B-funded HIV collaborative care clinic at Salud Family Health Center in Fort Collins. He provided consultations, including monthly on-site clinics, for 12 years until September of 2025.

Throughout his career at CU, he has been a busy clinician in the IDGP (1994-2025), on the UCH inpatient ID services (1994-2025), on the VAMC inpatient ID service (1994-2008), and at 5 outreach clinics: ARTS Denver, Mercy Durango (2000-2024), St. Mary's Grand Junction (2000-2024), Pueblo Community Health Center (2003-2025), and Salud Fort Collins (2013-2025). He has had over 55,000 patient encounters. Steve served as the Medical Director of the Colorado AIDS Education and Training Center from 1998-2004, then Medical Director of the Mountain-Plains AIDS Education and Training Center from 2005-2015, and then back as the Medical Director of the Colorado AIDS Education and Training Center from 2016-2025.

In 2016, Steve became the Associate Division Head for Clinical Affairs in the ID Division, continuing in this role until 2023. During this time, he expanded the inpatient clinical services and helped lead the division's clinical response to the COVID-19 pandemic. During his 31-year career at CU, he has given over eight hundred invited lectures, including local, regional, national, and international locations. He has also participated in both the NECTAR and COZIE programs in Zimbabwe. Steve is an author on 46 peer-reviewed publications, 29 book chapters/monographs/invited articles, 25 publications for the AIDS Education and Training Centers, and 58 abstracts.

Recognized as a national authority in HIV care, Dr. Johnson has been called upon to serve in numerous high-impact advisory roles. He was a member of the CDC/HRSA Advisory Committee on HIV and STD Prevention and Treatment from 2011 to 2015. From 2018 until his retirement in October 2025, he served on the DHHS Panel for the Guidelines for the Use of Antiretroviral Agents in Adults and Adolescents with HIV. He also contributed to the NIH COVID-19 Treatment Guidelines from their inception in March 2020 through April 2024 and remained a member of the IDSA COVID-19 Treatment Guidelines Panel until his retirement. Since 2007, he has served as a board member for the IAS-USA Cases on the Web, a role he continues to hold.

Steve's service to CU and UCH has been exceptional in both scope and influence. He was a member of the CU Medicine Board of Directors for 21 years (1999-2020), Co-Chair of the UCHealth Vaccine Subcommittee for 19 years (2006-2025), and a served on the Department of Medicine Assistant-Associate Professor Promotions Committee for 19 years (2006-2025).

His contributions have been recognized with numerous awards, including the President's Award for Outstanding Clinical Service (1998), the Outstanding Physician of the Year Award (2006), and the Lifetime Achievement Award (2024) from the University of Colorado Hospital Medical Staff. He received the COVID-19 Pandemic Leadership Response Team Award from the Department of Medicine in 2020. In addition, he has been recognized for 25 years of service at the St. Mary's Family Practice Center in Grand Junction and Mercy Regional Medical Center in Durango. He has also received recognition awards for

service on the DHHS Antiretroviral Treatment Guidelines Panel and the NIH COVID-19 Treatment Guidelines Panel. He has been recognized as a Top Physician in HIV and Infectious Diseases in *5280 Magazine* twelve times.

Steve, your leadership and presence will be greatly missed in our division and across the broader HIV care landscape. We are deeply grateful for your decades of service and the legacy you leave behind. We wish you all the best in retirement and look forward to staying connected.

Dr. Susan Buchbinder Visits as 2025 Tim Gill Visiting Professor

The Division was delighted to host Dr. Susan Buchbinder as the 2025 Tim Gill Visiting Professor on August 26 and 27. Dr. Buchbinder is appointed at the San Francisco Department of Public Health as Director of the Bridge HIV program, and she is affiliated as a clinical professor of medicine and epidemiology at the University of California San Francisco. Dr. Buchbinder has been at the forefront of HIV prevention research, leading landmark clinical trials of vaccines, PrEP, and other prevention strategies, and has been central to shaping the public health effort for HIV programs in San Francisco

and globally. During her visit, Dr. Buchbinder met with members of the community, delivered a compelling ID Grand Rounds presentation titled "Doxy-PEP: From Evidence to Implementation", and shared insights during Department of Medicine Grand Rounds with her talk "The Leading Edge of HIV Prevention." We extend our heartfelt thanks to Dr. Buchbinder for her invaluable contributions during this visit.

Awards



Dr. Steph Dillion, R03 Grant

Congratulations to Dr. Steph Dillion who scored in the 3rd percentile on an R03 grant! Steph serves as Principal Investigator, with division co-investigators Dr. Kristine Erlandson, Dr. Cara Wilson, Dr. Dan Frank, and Melissa Wilson.

The grant, titled "Gut Check: The Impact of Gut Bacteria on Physical Function in Older Adults with and without HIV," is a proof-of-concept study leveraging the NIH-supported MACS/WIHS Combined Cohort Study. It will explore specific microbial features of the gut

microbiome–physical function axis in older adults with and without HIV, and examine the microbiome's role as a longitudinal determinant of changes in physical function.



Dr. Szu-Wei Huang, Science Matters DOM Scholar in Infectious Diseases

Congratulations to Dr. Szu-Wei Huang on receiving an early-career investigator award for his project titled "Roles of HIV-1 Ribonucleoprotein Complexes in Regulating the Conical Architecture of the Mature Capsid and Nuclear Import of Viral Cores." The research will use advanced imaging techniques to investigate the role of vRNPs in the early phase of HIV-1 replication, with a particular focus on nuclear import.



Dr. Kellie Hawkins, David Cohn Scholar in Public Health

Congratulations to Dr. Kellie Hawkins on receiving an early-career investigator award for her study "Patient-Centered Development of an Intervention for Integrating Long-Acting ART into Low-Barrier HIV Care". Low-barrier care models for people with HIV (PWH) who have adherence challenges and face multiple barriers to care have demonstrated remarkable improvements in viral suppression.

Concurrently, long-acting antiretroviral therapy (LA-ART) is a highly effective, new tool for HIV management with the potential to have great impact among people who have difficulty adhering to daily oral pills. The objectives of her study are 1) To qualitatively assess preferences, barriers, and facilitators of LA-ART uptake among PWH with adherence challenges in the context of low-barrier care and 2) Develop an implementation plan for a low-barrier care intervention providing LA-ART choice (combined low-barrier/LA-ART intervention).



Dr. Kristine Erlandson, R01 for the REINFORCE Trial

Dr. Kristine Erlandson was awarded a 3-year R01 from NIDDK for "Incretin Microdosing for Cardiometabolic Health in People With HIV: The REINFORCE Trial." This multi-PI grant includes Drs. Jordan Lake (UT Houston) and Markella Zanni (MGB), with statistical support from Melissa Wilson.

Ryan White Part A Funding Update

Dr. Steven Johnson provided the following update on Ryan White Part A funding:

"We received our final notice of award for the Ryan White Part A grant for the current fiscal year, 3/1/25-2/28/26. We received a total award of \$879,819. This is 11% lower than last year, in part due to an overall cut in the grant to the City of Denver and in part due to other funding sources that we have obtained. However, given the current federal funds climate which has included major cuts to other HIV-related grants, I consider this award amount to be a great success. We are now in our 32nd year of Ryan White Part A funding with a cumulative award of over 27 million dollars! I wanted to say a special thank you to Lisa Lawrence and Barbara Palmer for decades of skillful management of the grant. And, of course, a thank you to the ID Division, the Department of Medicine, UCH (especially Tom Gronow), and the many physicians, APPs, nurses, pharmacists, medical assistants, social workers, front desk staff, administrators, and patient support team members who have delivered such great care to people with HIV!" -Steven Johnson
