This summer, CHA/PA Faculty member Claudia Luna-Asturias. LGSW spearheaded the planning of the first occurrence of a local health fair at the Trifinio-Salud Clinic in Guatemala. The clinic is a partner of the University of Colorado as an optional global site for students' clinical rotations and welcomes the CHA/PA Program in one of their rotations every year. In preparation for these rotations. students are immersed in the Spanish language and attend cultural awareness workshops for two weeks to equip them with the

Endocrinology/ Reproductive and HEENT/ Dermatology blocks of the Colorado Curriculum. She will also participate in the Stages of Life Thread where she will have the opportunity to continue her strong interest in health promotion. Denise was originally from Illinois but has lived in Colorado for the past 30 years. She graduated from the CHA/PA Program in 1996 and spent the next 22 years with Swedish Family Medicine Residency where she was a faculty member and practiced Family Medicine. Funded by the Center for Global Health and other partners of the Trifinio Salud Clinic, the fair's purpose was to unite the community and empower local families to live healthier lives with the help of the Salud clinic. This goal emerged after the need for better access to medical services and health information was discovered by Claudia and her colleagues while working with adolescents and their leaders at local schools.

Regarded as a success, the fair met all its specific goals in service to the community which were providing health information on prevention & well-being, an open house to the clinic space. empowerment of adolescents as health promoters, and involvement of staff and CU students in educational activities. In order to meet these goals, the team confronted a number of obstacles which included advertisement and transportation difficulties. The conference speakers were experts in the field of pediatric infectious disease. My favorite lectures made me think critically and challenged my current understanding of the field. These topics included: "Diagnosing and Managing Congenital CMV, Neonatal Herpes, and Congenital Zika" by Dr. David Kimberlin, "Honing Your Spidey Sense: A Rational Approach to Infectious Disease Diagnostics" by Dr. Kevin Messacar, and "What's New with the Flu?" by Dr. Suchitra Rao.

As a third year PA student, I was excited to find that much of the information applies to my current rotations and will be helpful in my future career as a pediatric PA. Overall, the conference left me feeling motivated to continue my medical education outside of the classroom and clinic environment.

Reflections on a Rotation in Guatemala

I had the amazing opportunity to travel down to Guatemala and spend a two-week rotation at the Trifinio Clinic. Many of the patients were from nearby communities or they worked at the local banana or palm oil plantations. Seeing the nurses and doctors care about their patients so much was inspiring, and they are so knowledgeable, patient, and helpful. Not only was I able to greatly improve my Spanish, I was able to see so many different patients and complaints.

I was given many opportunities to take a history and do a physical exam with patients on my own and also assist in many different procedures. I was even lucky enough to see a case of malaria in a 12-year-old boy. The clinic only had three cases of malaria last year, so it was a unique experience that I will treasure. It was amazing

to donate books, both new and used. Hundreds of different responses came through immediately, many of which were by teachers, alumni from our campus, parents with children who outgrew their books, book lovers, Salud supporters, etc. Although I was only able to collect from about 60 families across the Denver Metro Area, I collected between 2,000 and 3,000 books. Seeing how quickly others were so willing to donate, and with no hesitation, was inspiring.

It's so often that we focus on the bad things that happen in communities, but students were able to see how an accumulation of small deeds can accrue a huge amount of support. The magnitude of impact that a Book Drive can have on individuals, families, and communities deeply motivated first year students. By promoting community involvement within the first few weeks of the CHA/PA program, many students will take these memories with them as they enter clinical rotations, future employment and find more ways to give back to those who need it most, especially in their own community.


